MIKESY, Gábor: Geographical Names on the Cadastral Maps

Several hundred thousand geographic names in Hungarian and in other languages of the historic Hungary were registered with exact localisation during the cadastral works. This name list is a rich source of several linguistic (onomastics, dialectology, etc.), historic (local and economy history, etc.), and other disciplines. In the first years of the cadastral survey the names of the cadastral fields had been given by the local authorities, thus their linguistic and stylistic unification was completed later. The names of the cadastral fields have lost their importance in land registry.



SCHMIDT, Anikó: Cadastral Data Fraud in Ochodnica

In the second half of 1900, a special case was brought before the House of Representatives, alleging that the cadastral land register and property register in his possession had been forged by the Ochodnica district notary. An investigation was launched to determine whether the background to the case is negligence or wilful fraud related to electoral fraud. The Néppárt / Party of the People's MPs calling for proceedings against the district notary considered that the falsification of the documents was in line with the electoral abuses that were frequently encountered in Trencsén County, in order to keep the privilege of the electorate as narrow as possible.



REISZ, T. Csaba: Commemoration of Lajos Glaser (1903-1944)

He was a student of Jenő Cholnoky, Pál Teleki and Ferenc Fodor, and he got his degree in the Faculty of Economics of the University. He worked for several years at Teleki's Institute of Geography, then from 1934 he became an employee of the National Archives, gradually moving up the ranks. He was one of the greatest practitioners of historical geography in the period, and many of his works are still indispensable in historical research. In the archives he dealt with the expansion and processing of the map collection and wrote theoretical and methodological studies on the subject. His promising career was interrupted by the Holocaust: because of his Jewish ancestry, the Catholic scholar was taken to forced labour, from where he did not return.



IVÁN, Gyula: Changes in the Organizational Structure of the Hungarian Land Administration between the end of World War II and now

The study deals with the changes in organizational structure of Hungarian Land Administration (HLA, cadastre, land registration and land book) between the end of World War II and today. There are only a small number of sectors in the Hungarian economy, which has been changed so many times as the HLA. The political will strongly influenced the changes in several cases, which may have led to harmful, but even good decisions from professional aspects.
